Visa and financing your studies



Have you already applied for your visa?

Start the process early — appointment slots at German missions fill up quickly.



Proof of financial means

992 EUR per month, about 12,000 EUR for the year, must be shown (e.g. blocked account).



Duration

It takes anywhere from months to a year. Plan accordingly

Health insurance



Statutory health insurance is obligatory

All students under 30 must take out statutory cover before enrolment.



Over 30 years old?

Private health insurance applies instead. We also recommend third-party liability insurance.

You receive an admission email from the Admissions Office



Submit documents

Semester fee transfer, certified copies of highest degree, enrolment form, passport copy, inform health insurance (imp. for matriculation)



Enrolment certificate

Campus card, travel ticket, Wifi (eduroam) access



Studies begin

Start of studies with Introductory Events on 17 & 18 September 2026 (Know your Faculty & THB)

Bank account & registration

City registration at the Citizen Service Brandenburg, then open a bank account (tax number) — schedule both early.



Important

Please do not come to THB without arranging a place to stay before you arrive. THB cannot provide or guarantee your housing.

Residence permit appointments should also be scheduled as early as possible after arrival.

Apartment hunting & general difficulties

Why it's harder here than you might expect



Furnished rooms are scarce

Brandenburg an der Havel has very few furnished rooms on the open market, unlike bigger cities.



You're applying from abroad

Most applicants are still in their home country when admitted — and unfamiliar with how German house-hunting works.



Deposits & paperwork

Expect to pay a deposit, and to show proof of income or a guarantor — ask early what a landlord requires.



Dorm spots are limited

Not everyone gets a place in the student hall, and the dorm has no spots for applicants already over 30.



What helps most

- Start searching as early as possible — ideally before you fly
- Use the student dormitory application if you're eligible
- Ask the ZIS for the Guide to Finding Accommodation
- Be ready to view and decide quickly — good rooms go fast
